Actions YOU Can Take:

A boundary study committee has formed for BCPS to deal with overcrowding at schools in our area (such as Hampton Elementary). In Spring 2024, the Board of Education will consider and take action on the committee's recommendations, including holding a public hearing. We believe this is an opportunity to return the Rodgers Forge Apartments, which are literally across the street, back to RFES. This will add diversity and draw more open, inclusive boundaries to the school catchment area.

The boundary study committee put out this survey for community members to vote.

The Current Options as we understand them are:

Option A - includes RF apartments and Yorktown Drive

Option B - map 8, option A plus area across York near Ascension Lutheran Church

Option C - No Yorktown drive, Adds RF apartments, Rodgers Choice, Armagh Village and Cloisters

Option D - Minus Yorktown drive, Plus RF Apartments

The survey will run until December 17.

There is also a section <u>on the webpage</u> where you can let the boundary study committee know the importance of returning the Rodgers Forge Apartments to RFES, as the options are not set in stone. Please <u>visit the webpage</u> and add comments, such as "Please return the Rodgers Forge Apartments to Rodgers Forge Elementary."

Information for those if you concerned about overcrowding at RFES:


- O RFES is currently at 380 students, with our stated capacity of 411. Our pre-Covid numbers were 470 and we fit comfortably in the school.
- o The apartments would currently add around 32 students.
- o If we go below capacity, we run the risk of losing teachers. With decreasing numbers, staff numbers must go down as well.
- What about adding Pre-K?
 - O Right now, we have classrooms that go unused on certain days and two trailers that are empty. We don't plan to return to the days before West Towson was built when we had 9 trailers, but our school functions well using two trailers.

Recommendations:

Mexikid: A Graphic Memoir. Pedro Martin




Pedro Martin has grown up hearing stories about his abuelito—his legendary crime-fighting, grandfather who was once a part of the Mexican Revolution! But that doesn't mean Pedro is excited at the news that Abuelito is coming to live with their family. After all, Pedro has 8 brothers and sisters and the house is crowded enough! Still, Pedro piles into the Winnebago with his family for a road trip to Mexico to bring Abuelito home, and what follows is the trip of a lifetime, one filled with

laughs and heartache. Along the way, Pedro finally connects with his abuelito and learns what it means to grow up and find his grito.

Review from a 9 year old. "The story is about a kid going to Mexico with his family to bring his abuelito to America and find his abuelita's grave so they can save it from sinking soil. He finds out the secret to love (a big hat) and finds that money isn't the most important value. Along the trip, he learns that anyone can have big feelings and it will be fine. 
Booked – Kwame Alexander



Twelve-year-old Nick is a soccer-loving boy who absolutely hates books. In this graphic novel version of Booked, the follow-up to the Newbery Medal—winning novel The Crossover, soccer, family, love, and friendship take center stage as Nick tries to figure out how to navigate his parents' divorce, stand up to a bully, and impress the girl of his dreams. These challenges—which seem even harder than scoring a tie-breaking, game-winning goal—change his life, as well as his best friend's.

In this electric and heartfelt follow-up to Newbery Medal—winner The Crossover, soccer, family, love, and friendship take center stage as twelve-year-old Nick learns the power of words as he wrestles with problems at home, stands up to a bully, and tries to impress the girl of his dreams.


Audio Book recommendations:

The start of middle school is making him feel increasingly anxious, so his favorite person in the whole world, his grandfather, Bhai, gives him some well-meaning advice: Find one thing you're really good at and become the *best* at it.

Avery Bloom, who's bookish, intense, and afraid of many things, particularly deep water, lives in New York City. Bett Devlin, who's fearless, outgoing, and loves all animals as well as the ocean, lives in California. What they have in common is that they are both 12 years old and are both being raised by single, gay dads.

When their dads fall in love, Bett and Avery are sent, against their will, to the same sleepaway camp. Their dads hope they will find common ground and become friends - and possibly, one day, even sisters.

But things soon go off the rails for the girls (and for their dads, too), and they find themselves on a summer adventure that neither of them could have predicted. Now that they can't imagine life without each other, will the two girls (who sometimes call themselves Night Owl and Dogfish) figure out a way to be a family?


RFES Faculty Equity Committee Updates:


